What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	0	<i>Almost all of our children do not have access to swimming outside of school swimming lessons, therefore, the starting points of our swimmers is much lower than the national average. The children are grouped accordingly during their school swimming lessons and the swim teachers work hard to try and make accelerated progress with our children.</i>
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	0	<i>Access to swimming outside of curriculum lessons has impacted upon children being able to boost their knowledge of a range of swimming strokes.</i>
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	0	<i>Children need the top-up sessions to boost their attainment for the self-rescue scenarios.</i>

Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	No	<i>Our swimming lessons are taught by fully qualified and trained staff from our local leisure and sports facility at GL1. School staff often get in the water with children to support them under instruction from GL1 swimming teachers.</i>
